The Summer of Construction: Retaining Wall Project Imminent

Reflecting on the 2009-2010 academic year, I have to say it was quite a good year for New York Alpha. Over the course of the year, 14 upstanding young men have taken the Phikeia oath and joined our great brotherhood. The chapter presently has 51 active members. The next year is going to be an absolutely critical one from a recruitment standpoint, with an exceptionally large senior class of 20 men graduating this May. If you are aware of rising Cornellians who the chapter should be made aware of, please feel free to drop me or the recruitment chairmen an e-mail so that the brotherhood can proactively engage them early in the fall semester!

Since the last issue of *The Cayugan*, we've completed a few projects as well as some important maintenance tasks. At the tail end of the fall term, we completed the network and internet technology updates, and the brotherhood has been enjoying the greatly improved usability of the chapter's computing facilities. Also, thanks to the NYAEFI, the library is being furnished with



new tables and chairs, which should be in place by the end of the semester. I anticipate we'll see some positive results in the academic ranking of New York Alpha among Cornell fraternities in the coming semesters as a result.

In January, we managed to satisfy the City of Ithaca in renewing our annual certificate of compliance after some general maintenance activity. Part of that effort was patching some areas of the roof over the residential section of the house to get us through the winter and replacing or repairing some windows that were in urgent need.

We've been engaged with contractors bidding the imminent retaining wall project for the backyard. We will be making the selection of a bid in early-to-mid May, with work to begin in earnest shortly after Reunion (June 10-13). This substantial undertaking will go a long way toward preserving and increasing the utility of the backyard. I am really excited that we are finally going to execute this project, which we've been talking about for the last few years! We are planning to have a ribbon-

cutting ceremony during Homecoming 2010 to celebrate its completion.

In tandem with the construction taking place on the backyard this summer, we will be doing a complete overhaul of the roof over the residential section of the house, including the two-section roof above the kitchen entryway. We will be tearing off the existing roofing, repairing the deck where needed, and installing lifetime architectural shingles. It's not the most glamorous project I can think of, but it's essential and constitutes an important long-term investment in the structure.

Finally, this summer we are replacing 24 of the windows that are in the worst condition throughout the house with Marvin All-Ultrex windows. We have decided to install double-hung windows where possible for a variety of reasons, including increased natural light, better insulation, and more practical allowance for air conditioning during summer months.
