

President Shares House and Brotherhood Reports

With the 2013-2014 academic year behind us, it is an appropriate time to reflect on the status of Phi Delta Theta New York Alpha.

In a climate of high scrutiny, the chapter has taken a moment to chart their course for the next several years to come. This planning has resulted in a brotherhood-wide commitment to the values of Phi Delta Theta (friendship, sound learning, rectitude), a reaffirmation of the chapter's adherence to GHQ's policies, including alcohol-free housing and a continuation of a robust Phikeia program that meets the regulations of Cornell.

With these commitments in place, I believe that NY Alpha is poised to continue to thrive at Cornell. Looking at the results this past academic year, I without a doubt am bullish on our future. The brothers recruited 20 new members, increased their brotherhood GPA, and also sponsored two Iron Phi's who raised significant donations for philanthropic causes. The members today are as

motivated and passionate as I've seen in years, and I'm excited to see how next academic year unfolds.

From a physical structure standpoint, the membership has stepped up their care for the house and it's clearly visible to guests. The Housing Corporation is also coming to the table and accelerating physical improvements. Over the next six to nine months, we will see the completion of our library restoration, replacement of the Great Hall furniture, and improved access/usage of the backyard via trail ways and outdoor furniture. We are also starting the planning stages of the front-entry stairway to the kitchen; it is quickly reaching the point of safety hazard. The goal is to complete this major project during the summer of 2015, but with the stringent standards of the Ithaca Historical Society and Preservation Board, there are no guarantees.

As we move forward with these projects, it is with a fresh slate of Housing Corporation board members. At our Reunion Weekend 2014 meeting, we

A Successful Spring Recruitment Caps Off Another Great Year at New York Alpha



As the semester draws to a close, the brotherhood celebrates another successful year, marked by significant achievements in recruitment, academics, and philanthropy. To the credit of the leadership and hard work of the executive board, the brotherhood has

made tremendous strides toward advancing our chapter within the Greek community and in the greater Cornell community.

Through an emphasis on year-round recruitment and strong Rush Week programming, our chapter initiated an impressive 17 new members this spring, capping off a recruitment year that increased the total brotherhood size to 66 active members. Sporting members from each of Cornell's seven colleges, the brotherhood today represents a unique cross-section of the Cornell campus, composed of brothers with a wide diversity of interests and backgrounds.

The brotherhood has also seen substantial improvements in academic performance, earning a cumulative semester GPA of 3.37. This value represents a 7-percent

improvement over the previous year's academic performance. Through the generous support of the New York Alpha Education Fund, Inc., the chapter as also enjoyed several note-worthy physical improvements to the Bartels Academic Center, transforming the library into a hub for study and brotherhood meetings.

Lastly, this semester was marked by a historic achievement on the philanthropy front when one of our newest members, Zachary Warheit '17, became New York Alpha's first Iron Phi. To achieve this award, Zachary raised more than \$1,000 to be donated to

the gym and are working to replace it soon. In addition, we hope to renew our gym equipment soon, as it is old and outdated, and replace it with more modern exercise machines.







In fall 2012, we came in at 35th place with a GPA of 3.188—the addition of Beta Gamma class in spring 2013 caused us to increase our house’s GPA to 3.329, putting us in 18th place. Although this improvement is a step in the right direction, it is my hope that this semester we can continue to rise. At 2 Ridgewood, brothers make use of our excellent academic resources.
