

Updated gym, new exercise equipment, new refrigerators, and refurbished laundry room greatly improve living conditions for brothers




Greetings from Ithaca!

The Housing Corporation held a productive meeting during Homecoming Weekend to reflect on the previous year's projects

and to plan ahead for the future. Brothers spanning several decades gathered in the library on a pleasant fall morning to hear about the exciting work that the brotherhood has accomplished over the past year.

Though much at 2 Ridgewood Road remains the same, substantial projects have been completed since last year's Homecoming meeting that have improved the house and helped bring it up-to-date. These projects were possible thanks to the generous contributions of alumni and supported by a healthy increase in the under-

graduate brotherhood.

The Great Hall received new furniture, including couches, chairs, and tables. Additional storage and shelving were included in a refinishing of the laundry room to enhance the functionality of the updated machines. New refrigerators were installed in the kitchen in conjunction with an ex-

tensive cleaning. Finally, the gym was entirely redone, and modern exercise equipment was provided.

The Housing Corporation identified and prioritized other needs and worked to budget accordingly. One of the major projects on the horizon is a revamp of the bedrooms. The Housing Corporation has decided to proceed with the project on a room-by-room basis as the funding becomes available. If you would like to assist with this project, \$500 will replace a mattress, box spring, and bedframe, or

\$1,000 will refurbish an entire bedroom; this includes a dresser, desk, and chair.

Brothers, this year is expected to be an incredibly productive and exciting one for Phi Delt philanthropy!

The house has decided to increase its philanthropic presence on the campus at large, not only to raise as much money as possible for worthy causes but to increase our presence and participation in the greater Greek community. Keeping with this spirit, many of our planned events include another fraternity or sorority.

Our first philanthropy event, a charity barbecue with the Delta Delta Delta Sorority, will be held in October. We will set up Can Jam and several other sunny weather games on North Campus, encouraging freshmen to buy a hot dog or hamburger and enjoy a nice day with our brotherhood. Several other ideas have been discussed and may come to fruition: a game of Philinko in Ho Plaza; a reverse ice bucket challenge, where participants pay to dump ice water onto brothers; and possibly even a pig roast or block party with our neighboring Greek houses.

In addition to our own events, the brotherhood also plans to participate in a large number of philanthropy events put on by Cornell, other fraternities and sororities, and national organizations. These include Kappa Alpha Theta's Jog for Ingrid and the Relay for Life. In addition, brothers will be organized into groups to volunteer at Ithaca-area organizations, including the local soup kitchen or Tompkins County SPCA.

The final goal for philanthropy this semester is to encourage all interested brothers to become Iron Phi.


