ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT: PHIL BARTELS '71

When Cornell University recently announced that one of our own, Phil Bartels '71, had been selected as a recipient of the highest honor given to alumni volunteers, we were all thrilled—but not surprised.

Phil's influence on the Cornell community and Phi Delta Theta has been felt across generations. For those of you who were in and around the chapter nearly six decades ago, you probably remember Phil the undergraduate; some of the stories that he has told of his time on campus are well received. However, inside 2 Ridgewood Road, it is his legacy as an alumnus that casts the longest shadow.

It's hard to find one area of the house that Phil has not positively impacted. The physical items are certainly visible: a retaining wall to prevent the house from sliding off the hill, a restored piano in the Great Hall, the restoration of the Shields Room in honor of Jerry Shields, the modern wi-fi system and increased capabilities to support remote learning, and most notably, a high-tech library that bears his name. I can recall when Brother Ivan Dashkov '11 suggested naming the library in his honor, as a result of his work establishing the NYAEFI, the purchase of new tables, and the installation of new doors and windows. There was unanimous consent to do so, and we wanted to make sure that the plaque that was added came from brotherhood funds as a small indication of our gratitude.

In their statement recognizing Phil, Cornell noted the many ways that his generosity is seen across campus: the Lab of Ornithology, the men's and women's swimming and diving teams, the Paleontological Research Institution, and the Cornell Shoals Marine Laboratory. Many undergraduates' first registration

occurs in Bartels Hall. This has earned Phil the distinction as a Cornell foremost benefactor. Cornell also notes that his generosity has extended to his home community through his affiliations with the Greenwich Audubon Society and at the University of New Haven.



However, for those of us volunteers, what is most impressive about Phil is the commitment of his time. We have come to rely on his expertise in countless areas. From troubleshooting internet access problems and diving deeper into the workings of wireless access points than perhaps he did in

the pool, to representing the chapter with the local preservation committee's often-contradictory building regulations, Phil has stepped up and found solutions.

Phil is a humble, kind, practical leader, who's dependability is never in question. When Phil agrees to take something on, there is a relief from undergraduates and alumni alike, because there is a confidence not only that the project will be done but that it will be done at the highest level and with no compromises. He approaches these problems with a personal touch, and even the most mundane chore can be made better as a result of his involvement. Phil's homecoming visits to campus represented some of the greatest memories for the undergraduates, as he would host a dinner for alumni volunteers and the undergraduate chapter leadership.

Cornell's announcement notes that he is a friend and advisor to deans, directors, professors, and countless students. We are deeply honored to be able to add the title "brother" to that list.

Thank you, Phil, for all that you do, and congratulations from all of us.

During the fall semester of 2020, Phi Delta Theta held several new fundraising events. The first was for the Weekend to End Homelessness, which raised \$270 to distribute basic necessities to the homeless in Los Angeles. A month later, 10 members of the brotherhood



PETER BELL '86

Congratulations to Brother Peter Bell, whose work as an advocate and business executive earned him recognition in Phi Delta Theta's national publication, *The Scroll*. Peter has had a significant impact, improving the lives of others through various roles in the nonprofit and public-service areas.

Peter served as president and CEO of Cure Autism Now, one of the country's first

autism advocacy organizations, from 2004 to 2007. He championed the passage of federal legislation, including the Combating Autism Act. He then served as executive vice president of Autism Speaks, and then president and CEO of Eden Autism. He has been president and CEO of Ascendigo since May 2017. The vision of Ascendigo is to build upon a proven model that allows individuals with autism to thrive, reaching their potential within the communities where they live, work, and play, regardless of their challenges. Peter uses the education

he received from Cornell's School of Hotel Administration and the Kellogg School of Management at Northwestern in combination with the personal connection of being a parent to a child with autism.

President Barack Obama recognized Peter's talents and appointed him to the Presidential Committee for People with Intellectual Disabilities. Peter's public service also includes founding and chairing the consumer advisory committee of the International Society for Autism Research and serving as the vice

Ian Kreher has been a faculty member at Spring-side Chestnut Hill Academy, an elite Philadelphia preparatory school, since 2014. He teaches mathematics to the school's top students, including courses such as multivariable calculus and linear algebra. Unlike most traditional high schools, students at SCH are given a full semester to pursue a passion project, and Ian works with the


students who wish to develop and launch small businesses based around products or services that they design themselves.

MATTHEW KURTAS '14

Brother Matthew Kurtas, certified sommelier, certified club manager, New York Alpha #1886, and Iron Phi #355, was tested in the waters of crisis

before the pandemic began in early 2020 as a business leader in the Pittsburgh area.

Kurtas, the general manager/chief operating officer of greater Pittsburgh's Edgeworth Club, took the job at a young 25 years old, using the knowledge he

learned of board relations and Roberts Rules from Phi Delta Theta, plus the lifetime of wisdom from his also-club-manager-father Michael T. Kurtas Jr., CCM, CCE. Kurtas's prior employment included learning and leadership at the prestigious

Union League Club of Philadelphia, the Boothbay Harbor Yacht Club of Maine, and the exclusive Loxahatchee Club of Jupiter, Florida, founded 1985.

In a recent tests as a young leader in his current post, Kurtas took the job soon after a historic loss and claim related to a 330-year-old oak tree falling onto the building in Sewickley, Pennsylvania. He was hired as a change agent to rectify the club's budget, to improve the services of the club, and to develop a long-term capital plan for sustainability. Shortly into his term, after cleaning up the "oak tree incident" of 2017, Kurtas responded to a building crisis, where the ornate plaster ceiling in the rotunda lobby collapsed two stories to the marble floors below. Luckily, no one was hurt. Engaging crisis-management tactics, Kurtas oversaw \$560,000 in insurance disbursements, a communication and construction schedule, and restoration of the historic space

with marginal interruptions to operations and at no cost to his members. All this, just as the COVID-19 pandemic shut down the country in early 2020. Kurtas guided the club through multiple shutdowns and interruptions related to COVID-19 and remains the GM at the club to date.

In his time at Cornell University, Brother Kurtas devoted much of his studies to the business practices of private clubs and food and beverage operations at the School of Hotel Administration, as well as the practice of winemaking in the Finger Lakes Region at the Cornell School of Agriculture and Life Sciences. He has spoken to student groups and professionals about raising the bar, figuratively, when it comes to programming a proper wine list. In his volunteer commitments, Brother Kurtas is a member of the Pittsburgh Club Management Association of America, and he has five years of committee service to the national organization, the Club Management Association

of America, through which he is certified as a CCM. Kurtas continues to serve in his third year as a director on the board of directors for the International Wine Society of Club Managers. He is a member of the Hospitality Financial and Technology Professionals and is currently pursuing his Certified Hospitality Accounts Executive designation. He uses his certified sommelier status through the Court of Master Sommeliers to help others find their passion for the world of beverage, particularly wine. While Kurtas enjoys volunteerism and certification, he notes most certificates are simply licenses to learn, giving yourself permission to fall in love with a topic over and over again.

To top things off, Matthew celebrates the 11-year anniversary of good health and recovery from brain surgery and a stroke this November of 2021! Kurtas resides in Shippenville, Pennsylvania, with his incredibly supportive wife, Alexis Marie Burns, and their sassy miniature Schnauzer, Ruby.
